Sometimes it can be hard to know what to pray or how to pray.

We watch in horror and helplessness as violence continues in Gaza, Ukraine and others places throughout our world. We live with the perpetual anxiety of climate crisis and wonder what difference we can make. We are deeply concerned about the desperate social issues we see in our communities and long to transform lives.

And so, we have trust in God, whose love is unconditional and whose hope is eternal and we pray, not for easy answers, but for divine presence.

When I struggle to know what to pray, I find ancient prayers and oft sung hymns can be helpful and therefore I commend to you Alan Gaunt's hymn as a framework for your devotion on the first day of the month.

We pray for peace, but not the cruel peace leaving God's poor bereft and dying in distress; we pray for real peace, enriching all the human race.

We pray for peace, and not the evil peace defending unjust laws and nursing prejudice, but for the real peace of justice, mercy, truth and love. We pray for peace: holy communion with Christ our risen Lord and every living thing; God's will fulfilled on earth and all creation reconciled.

We pray for peace, and, for the sake of peace, look to the risen Christ, who gives the grace we need to serve the cause of peace and make our own self-sacrifice.

God, give us peace; if you withdraw your love there is no peace for us, nor any hope of it. With you to lead us on, through death or tumult, peace will come.

Cheshire South (11/8) (1)

We have faced some challenges this last year and have embarked upon mission planning for the future. We are looking to a balanced and sustainable budget and mission-focused staffing with a mix of lay and ordained staff alongside our team of stewards and others who give time and energy above and beyond. Some property schemes and new staff have been approved and embarked upon to focus a new approach to mission. Thanks for praying with us and for us!

The Cheshire South Circuit contains the differing towns of Alsager, Audlem, Crewe, Nantwich, Sandbach, and Whitchurch and many rural villages and settlements including one chapel just inside Wales. Our Circuit churches are grouped into three Mission Networks to facilitate resources for mission. Engagement with poverty and deprived areas both inspires and challenges churches in the Circuit; recent surveys of churches and communities in the Sandbach & Alsager Network have revealed levels of deprivation previously overlooked, and ways of serving that have been affirmed. Most of our churches are small and rural and seeking to find ways to continue as everyone gets older.

During the past year we have been sharing around the Chester & Stoke-on-Trent Methodist District the training which many in our churches have been invited to participate in from the perspective of particular roles. We were invited to slow down our decision-making processes, to take a breath before making judgments on activities within our communities as part of our commitment to really celebrating diversity. For myself, I was heartened by the number of people who fed back that they had found it a useful time, and asked if the material can be shared more widely in local churches. The answer, of course is an emphatic **YES!!** The more widely the conversation is shared, the greater will be the benefit of the wisdom and prayer surrounding matters of EDI. We at Englesea Brook Chapel and Museum have been working hard to make our site (both physical and virtual) accessible to all. Part of this mission is to become a playful museum. This means giving ourselves and our visitors permission to explore creatively and fearlessly. You may find at the museum some obvious 'playful' touches such as a dedicated children's space, free activities for sensory-seekers, a welcome to furry companions such as dogs and bears, but there is a more profound 'permission' at play (forgive the pun): to allow ourselves freedom to experience the story of the remarkable Christian social justice movement of the Primitive Methodist (PM) Society.

Chief Executive: Lloyd Cooke

A charity with Christian values supporting faith groups, older people, those at risk of homelessness and those in debt. Saltbox is synonymous across Stoke-on-Trent and beyond for promoting united Christian mission and unity including such initiatives such as City Celebrations and the annual Civic Prayer Breakfast (which attracted over 350 people in 2024). Additionally, Saltbox also provides community-based services for vulnerable and marginalised members of society. As we reach out to those in need our heart is to help to give practical help and support recognising that God wants to bless all people. Our three caring services:

- CareLink helps 300 lonely and isolated older people to socialise and maintain healthy independence in their own homes;
- Restart offers support, housing and spiritual development to 120 homeless people and, specifically, ex-offenders;
- Money Matters helps 200 Foodbank clients on low incomes with advice and debt management.

We work hard to nurture potential partnership opportunities with statutory, voluntary and community organisations to help bring about community cohesion and transformation. Our Christian faith is paramount in everything we do and is the foundation that Saltbox is built on. On a continued basis, we work with churches and faith groups to promote UNITY, PRAYER and MISSION across the region.

Market Drayton is a unique town quite isolated in many respects due to its location and poor public transport links. Its main employer is Mullers with approx. 6000 employees. The Methodist Church is a lively, community focussed Christian family with a lively and growing children's and youth work. Due to various factors we are seeking God's way forward as a church and circuit and are in discussions with various parties to outwork God's purposes and plans for our future. We continue to reach those marginalised by the oppression of sin and the world's injustices by showing the unique love and power of our Lord Jesus Christ, who alone is able to save.

We do this by preaching the Gospel and demonstrating it through our work with Christians Against Poverty, supporting Christian Concern, the baby-loss group, youth street outreach, toddler group, ministering to the agricultural community through our weekly livestock market outreach, connections with the local Air Training Corp, baby banks, biker outreach, and training and enabling young leaders to grow in their faith. Potteries Mission (11/15) (1)

As anyone who visits Stoke will realise, it is a post-industrial conurbation. Its heritage of pits and 'potbanks' (potteries) is visible everywhere, but the spoil heaps from the pits have been redeveloped into nature reserves and the potbanks have become museums. The town centres have many boarded-up shops and there is evidence of deprivation everywhere. Many fine buildings are falling into decay, including former churches. Nevertheless, Stokies have a strong sense of local pride, often focussed on one of the two football clubs.

The Potteries Mission Circuit is one of two Stoke circuits, and comprises sixteen churches, stretching from Brown Edge in the north to Trentham and Blythe Bridge in the south. Most are in the 'six towns' but some are slightly beyond the boundaries of Stoke-on-Trent in rural Staffordshire.

DAY 21 Cheshire Agricultural Chaplaincy

Lead Chaplain: Helen Rutter

Our mission is to serve the farming community. We listen, advocate, walk alongside in difficult circumstances, signpost to resources, and raise awareness of the problems farmers face to a wider audience.

This year, we are focusing on resilience in our rural communities by raising awareness of mental health, building confidence together to have difficult conversations, and challenging language that reinforces stigma. We are excited to be partnering with Pwrpas to deliver mental health awareness training in October.

Current Challenges

For many years, farmers have relied on subsidies because the full cost of food production is not recognised. Producing food involves significant expenses: rent, mortgages, energy, labour, feed, seeds, fertilisers, machinery, fencing, storage, and daily operations. Supermarkets have consistently driven down prices, converting these subsidies into cheap food. As these subsidies quickly diminish, many farmers now live below the poverty line unless their businesses are exceptionally secure, putting countless livelihoods at risk and straining family relationships.

Farmers also face intense scrutiny over animal welfare, despite having some of the highest standards globally. Misinformation about hormone and antibiotic use worsens their situation. Sheep thefts and dog attacks add to their stress and sense of being misunderstood.

This year has been especially tough due to adverse weather affecting crops and winter feed for livestock. These pressures lead to poor mental health among farmers, resulting in one of the highest suicide rates of any industry. It is crucial to recognise and address these challenges, supporting our farmers who continue to provide our food under increasingly difficult circumstances. Their wellbeing is vital for their communities and the entire food supply chain.

In line with this year's theme of "Praise and Protest," inspired by Isaiah's three key actions for becoming a justice-seeking Church, we encourage you to include the following in your prayers:

Learn

Almighty God, guide us to be attentive to Your ways. Help us discern how we can live justly in our local communities and churches. Teach us to understand the challenges faced by our farming communities and inspire us to learn how to support them better.

Seek

Loving God, we seek Your presence and guidance. Open our eyes to see Your ways and to love our neighbours as ourselves. Show us how to recognise injustice in our midst and give us the courage to act. May we actively look for what You are revealing to us as the Body of Christ, both corporately and personally.

Defend

Merciful God, help us to become more aware of the voices of the marginalised and silenced. We pray for the strength to support others in their protest and to stand up for those who cannot defend themselves. Empower us to get involved and make a difference in the lives of those in our farming communities.

- the unwavering dedication of our chaplains and volunteers who tirelessly support our farming communities;
- the resilience and strength of farmers who continue to provide food despite significant challenges;
- partnerships like the one with Pwrpas that help us address mental health issues and build stronger, more supportive communities;

The Beacon house of Prayer started as a Methodist fresh expression in 2007 and is now a non-denominational charity, creating a dedicated place for prayer for individuals and Christian groups, and involving a small dispersed community who facilitate and lead the ministry.

This last year has been encouraging in many ways in the life of the Beacon. Although we no longer meet on a Sunday, we have established community touching points, some healthy rhythms of prayer and sustainable ways of staffing and hosting in the house. Numbers in our community have stabilized as have financial support. There have been opportunities to develop ministry and activities online, and we feel the Beacon continues to be a valuable presence in the city and wider. The Beacon is now much more visible, with a petrol station development just completed on the corner of the land by us. We continue to develop opportunities to serve the churches of the Stoke on Trent and local communities. The beacon hosts special evenings of worship, leads half day retreats, becomes a hub for prayer at Christian festivals, and networks amongst other houses of prayer in the UK.

Our current projects include creating a prayer garden next to the Beacon, and developing a café space on a Friday morning, 'Transformation Café', to offer friendship and prayers for healing to those in the local community. William is in the middle of a year-long prayer mission to visit the 51 capital cities of Europe, to meet Christians and do a prayer walk with the cross in each place.

District Mission Enabler: Revd David Willis

Over this last year we have been working hard trying to discern and form our District strategy around New Places for New People (NPNP). It is hoped Connexionally that through partnerships and by resourcing NPNP – new Christian communities can form for those not yet part of an existing church. We often now hear folk in wider society describing themselves as 'spiritual, but not religious', and allowing emergent faith communities that can speak into this reality, in a natural and organic way, feels really important for us moving forward.

There are three principles that we believe need to be central:

- 1. We identify places of real potential that may be able to form distinct faith communities.
- 2. Through partnerships with these places and using the resources on offer, create a consistent and intentional presence.
- 3. Building strong relationships seek to naturally discover organic ways of engaging with faith (i.e. discover what a Methodist way of Life means/looks like for them)

Allowing things to be 'emergent' though, has been a little scary. As it requires real patience, discerning and listening. Which are not necessarily all qualities I personally revel in. However, as we continue to move forward and the pieces fall into place, it does feel spirit led and that has been so reassuring.

Alongside all of this, over this next Connexional year, I will continue to seek to support all our Local Churches and Circuits in developing their mission and ministry. So, if there is anything I can do to support your church or Circuit do feel free to give me a shout. I don't necessarily have all the answers to hand, but I am more than willing to go on a journey with you so that we may discover them together.
